Convenience Store Woman, originally コンピニ人間 (Konbini Ningen) is a 2016 novel by Japanese author Sayaka Murata. This novel won Japan's biggest literary prize, the biannual Akutagawa. This was Murata's 10th novel in Japanese but her shot to global fame as it was her first novel to be translated into English as well as 30 other languages; this novel was superbly translated by Ginny Tapley Takemori and has now sold more than 2 million copies in 40 countries. Murata's

degree at Tokyo's Tamagawa University was in art curation; the course combined art, music, literature and theatre. Murata's incredible imagination is almost inhumane to her acquaintances, but for the case of *Convenience Store Woman*, it came from her origin story as she worked in various convenience stores for 15 years and is also unmarried. Murata's work is to expose the absurdities and hypocrisies of various conventional beliefs and her characters wrestle constantly with the notion of normality, similar to herself. (Mesure, 2024)

Convenience Store Woman serves as an exploration of the mundane daily existence of Keiko Furukura, a seemingly unremarkable 36-year-old woman who has spent the entirety of her adult life working in a convenience store. Unlike most of her peers, Keiko does not adhere to societal expectations regarding marriage, career advancement, or social conformity. Instead, her self-acceptance journey unfolds through the seemingly mundane tasks and rigid routine of the convenience store, which provides her with stability and a sense of belonging. Throughout the novel, Keiko's journey is marked by her increasing awareness of how different she is from those around her, and her growing realization that her own path to fulfillment lies outside conventional norms.

Keiko's acceptance is not a psychological or emotional process, but a practical one. She found her purpose not by introspective moments of reflection, but by her actions, interactions, and the structure of her job. Through her work at the convenience store, Keiko learns that she does not need to conform to the societal expectations. Instead, her self-acceptance moment occurs as she embraces her role within the store, discovering that fulfillment can be found in simplicity and routine. The novel challenges the notion that self-worth must be tied to societal success, and instead suggests that personal meaning can be constructed in unconventional spaces. The store becomes her sanctuary, providing her with a purpose and identity she could not find elsewhere.

This research paper will examine Keiko's journey of self-acceptance, focusing on how her experiences in the convenience store shape her identity, allow her to reject societal pressures and ultimately lead to a deeper understanding of herself. By analyzing her inner struggles and the convenience store's role in her

life, this research paper will explore the role routine and the rejection of societal expectations play in Keiko's personal journey.

1.7 Status of the Study

Raluca Nicolae in her journal article titled *The Modern Shape-shifter Maiden* in Sayaka Murata's Convenience Store Woman discusses about the main character's journey in life and how she has become a modern shape-shifter who regularly practices the art of imitation and employs different strategies in order to be upgraded from a part-time member to a full-time member of normalcy. Nicolae also stated that the ending is quite prophetic and it parallels to Keiko's situation since in her professional life she has failed to get a full-time job and that she will not make any progress as a full-fledged normal person. (Nicolae, 2018)

Mochamad Chotib, Sherinkeshia Syahnia, and Heditya Widodo in their journal article titled *The Influence of The Store as Spatial Setting Toward the Main Character's Development in Sayaka Murata's Convenience Store Woman* which is a literary criticism which comprises the theory of New Criticism, especially its argument that centers on the analysis of the main character in the story. This research proposes that spatial settings can become one of the most determinant

factors to affect the character's development in the story. The finding proves that the store is influential to the main character's development as it plays as the character's life-anchor to evaluate, measure or even decide how worthy the main character is as a human. Before the convenience store, Keiko had an obscure personality with a logical and dichotomous mindset, resulting in her isolation from society. This article also highlights the difference in Keiko's personality before and during working in the convenience store. (Chotib, Syahnia, & Widodo, 2023)

Gracia Chambers in her journal article titled Aesthetic Engagement and Soundscape: A Case of Convenience Store Woman, a Contemporary Japanese Novel wherein she discusses the novel through the theory of social aesthetics. The paper argues that the convenience store's environment such as the social interactions, and soundscape presented in the novel, this article also discusses regarding the main character's auditory sensibilities, and how society would ignorantly and unkindly judge people working in a convenience store for too long as it is at the expense of making certain societal, progressive moves, yet Keiko sees working at a convenience store as being both quantitatively and qualitatively sufficient; it provides not only a means of earning her living but also making a life. (Chambers, 2023)

Despite using the same corpus, the writer of this research paper will not use the same theory and thus will not achieve the same results as the studies mentioned above. The writer will use the self-acceptance aspects to analyze the novel *Convenience Store Woman*.
